

Finding a *durable* balance among economic, security and sustainability objectives that stands the test of time




Durable Energy Policy

Striking a durable balance is forever a work in progress

Balance is shifting (back) towards affordability/economy and security

In Canada, durable balance means a balance that:

- √ Secures public confidence
- √ Secures investor confidence
- ✓ Respects Indigenous rights
- ✓ Maintains national unity (federally)




Energy Policy and Electricity Utilities

- Big investors








Public Confidence: A Three-Legged Stool

REFORMING ENERGY DECISION-MAKING TO BUILD PUBLIC AND INVESTOR CONFIDENCE










Key Questions

- Are reforms to NTPC governance being undertaken through the lens of the entire GNWT energy decision system?
- Is GNWT policy timely, clear and predictable enough for NTPC to understand its role in the broader energy system?
- Will reforms secure confidence of the public as citizens, consumers and community members?
- Will they secure the confidence of the NTPC as an investor?



Key Questions

- Are energy planning processes robust and do the NTPC and other key organizations and rights holders have the capacity they need?
- Is it it clear who (GNWT, PUB, NTPC) decides what, when and how for energy and cost allocation (rate base versus taxbase)?
- Are there adequate mechanisms for coordination within government and between governments?
- Do reforms need to be more about changing mandates or changing mindsets (org culture)?

NWT Active Living Framework and Sport Integrity

Presentation to the Standing Committee on Government Operations

June 13, 2025

Introduction

- MACA is implementing the Active Living Framework (ALF) 2023-2033: a strategic approach to recreation, sport, and physical activity.
 - It supports MACA's mandate of promoting the social well-being of communities by providing recreation and sport opportunities to residents.
 - It supports GNWT's mandate commitment to support the development and delivery of community-based wellness programs.

Background

- Active living landscape in the NWT
 - Territorial and regional organizations
 - Territorial sports organizations
 - Community governments, schools, and non-government organizations
- 2005 Sport and Recreation Council (SRC) established
 - Administer lottery program, provide shared administration and common vision and priorities for the system
- 2016 SRC wound down
 - Lottery and funding to sector brought into MACA
 - Minister committed to developing a SPAR policy



Western Canada Lottery Act

- The Act was enacted in 2018 and established a Physical Activity, Sport and Recreation Fund to disburse funds to:
 - Promote and deliver physical activity, sports and recreation programs,
 - Develop coaching,
 - Support high-performance athletes,
 - Operate the lottery program, and
 - Advance physical activity, sport and recreation in the NWT.



NWT Active Living Framework 2023-2033

- A policy framework to guide GNWT planning and decisions about allocation of funding for active living.
- Sets out GNWT's vision, priorities and goals for active living.
- Informed by public engagement.

NWT Active Living Framework 2023-2033

Six areas for action:

- Prioritize Indigenous cultures and practices
- Build sector capacity
- Celebrate and support local champions
- Improve access to, and increase opportunities for, participation in recreation, sport, and physical activity
- Promote the value of active living
- Invest in active living with sustainable, flexible funding



Implementation

- 2024 Advisory Committee established with representation from the key sector territorial and regional partners (ISCNWT, NWTRPA, SNF, MRA) and MACA SRY
- This group has worked collaboratively to produce:
 - A draft three-year Action Plan
 - A Monitoring and Evaluation Plan
 - A common reporting template to implement the M&E Plan



Draft Action Plan

- Contains proposed actions to support Active Living Framework action areas and goals
- Highlights existing programs and activities that are aligned with the Framework
- Proposes new initiatives to drive change
- Focuses on setting a solid foundation for moving forward

Future direction

- Sector challenges include:
 - Sustainability of Western Canada Lottery Program revenues
 - Partner funding has remained flat for 10 years
 - Impact of cost of living on ability to deliver programs
- Priorities for action in next three years:
 - Explore potential for achieving efficiencies through shared services
 - Explore potential for reducing duplication in programming



What is SafeSport?

- Shift to Sport Integrity
 - Prevention of Harassment, Abuse and Discrimination in Sport
 - NWT has included concussions and injury prevention
 - Independent Third-Party Reporting Mechanism



NWT Safe Sport Framework

- TSO Implementation
 - Requirements for starting April 1, 2026
 - Mandatory Policies, incorporation of an independent third party
 - Governance and Policy supports
 - Opportunity for Sport Sector efficiencies and alignment
 - Sport Integrity training and resources



NWT Independent Third Party - ALIAS



- 3-year contract
- UCCMS complaints
- Available for participants of MACA-funded sport organizations



Current Status

Complete:

- Bylaw review for compliance
- Templates of sport integrity policies

Next steps:

- Agreement to work with ALIAS and the GNWT, or use of an equivalent third-party complaint investigation mechanism
- Sport Organization Bylaw updates and Policy adoption
- Increased public transparency
